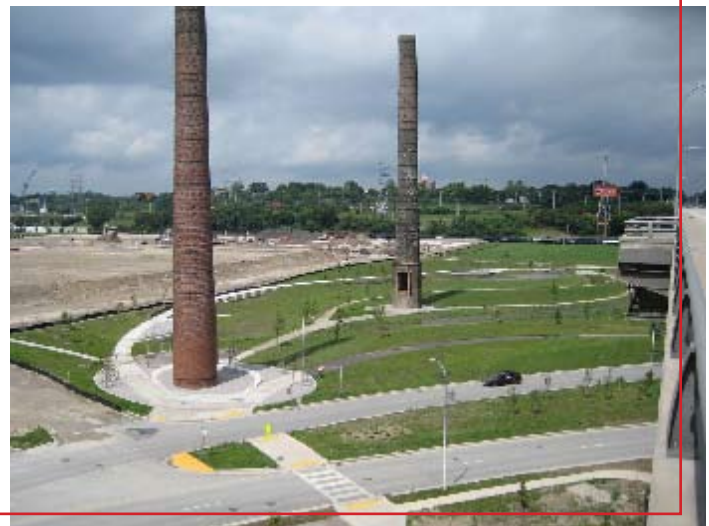


Valley's Redevelopment Creates Thousands of Jobs

Since the start of Valley redevelopment efforts in 1998, the impact can clearly be seen in real job growth. 2,100 new jobs have been created in the Menomonee Valley through company expansions and relocations, and projects currently under construction in the Valley will add another 2,000 jobs by the end of 2008. In addition, much of the redevelopment work has been done by small local firms, emerging businesses that provide jobs to area residents.

Valley's Signature Development Project Progress

The Valley's signature project, the development of the former Milwaukee Road Shops site into the Menomonee Valley Industrial Center (MVIC) and Community Park, combines job-creating industrial development with environmental restoration. In the 2002 national design competition, Wenk Associates produced an innovative master plan that led to the creation of 60 acres of industrial land and 60 acres of public park. To date, 20 acres of land in the MVIC have been sold to growing manufacturing businesses, creating 428 jobs. In 2007, two companies opened new facilities, one company broke ground and two additional sales are pending. In the park, hundreds of volunteers planted trees, shrubs and grasses, wildlife returned to the Menomonee River, and neighbors, employees and commuters discovered the park's amenities for hiking, biking, and picnicking. While the development is not yet complete, this project has already been recognized by the Sierra Club as one of the 10 Best Developments in the Nation, demonstrating that the Menomonee Valley truly is a national model for sustainable development.



Significant Infrastructure Improvements Made

Interior roads in the MVIC were completed in November, improving access to new Valley businesses. Milwaukee Road, the main road through the MVIC, honors the site's history as the Milwaukee Road Shops. Wheelhouse Road, Roundhouse Road and 36th Street provide ample street parking for business use as well as visitors to the Menomonee Valley Community Park. The stairs connecting the 35th Street Viaduct to the Valley floor also opened in November, along with a new Route 35 bus stop at the top of the viaduct. Valley employees began using the stairs the day they opened, and neighbors also use them to access recreation in the Valley.

Record Numbers Visit Valley Destinations This Year

Potawatomi Bingo Casino and Miller Park both enjoyed record breaking attendance levels in 2007. Potawatomi Bingo Casino drew 4.2 million visitors and Miller Park, home to the Milwaukee Brewers, drew 2.8 million visitors. Next time you come to these top attractions, stop and explore; you may be surprised how quickly things are developing in the Valley.

Hank Aaron State Trail Signs Installed

Signs were installed along the Hank Aaron State Trail to mark its path and interest points. Trail users are now discovering the two riverwalks in the central Valley. The 2-mile River Loop runs behind Marquette University's Valley Fields with entrances at 25th Street and Emmer Lane and the shorter Sigma loop runs behind The Sigma Group's Building at 1300 W. Canal Street. Now is a great time to explore the Trail and take it to your destination, from Miller Park to Lakeshore State Park. The 2007 Hank Aaron State Trail Run/Walk was a great success, drawing nearly 1,000 people to the Valley.

Mark your calendar for the 2008 Run/Walk on Saturday, August 9. – Hank Aaron is scheduled to be there.

Public Art Installed Throughout Valley

To honor the 40th anniversary of the Milwaukee open housing marches led by Father James Groppi, the Friends of the Hank Aaron State Trail worked with area schools and community groups to create public art along the Trail's Menomonee River Loop, between 13th and 25th Streets. *Eight Boulders and a Gazebo*, was dedicated October 27, marking the connection between the Valley and the Merrill Park neighborhood to the north. The gateway at Canal and N. 32nd Streets now hosts a welcoming

gazebo, an interpretive sign describing the Valley's historical connections to its surrounding neighborhoods, and a boulder whose inscription explains that the word "Menomonee," means wild rice. Other boulders can be found beneath the 35th Street viaduct at Canal Street and throughout the Merrill Park neighborhood.

Major Projects Build Anticipation for 2008

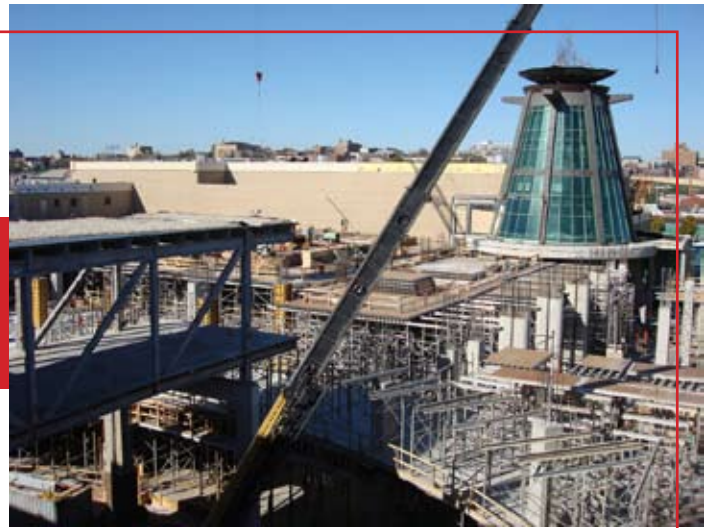
Construction is progressing on the two largest construction projects in the Menomonee Valley, the Harley-Davidson Museum and the Potawatomi Bingo Casino expansion. Harley-Davidson's building signage is visible and a new riverwalk along the Menomonee River has taken form. Down the road, the Potawatomi expansion is rising from the Valley floor. In June, Potawatomi opened a new bridge connecting the 16th Street viaduct to the casino parking structure, providing another easy point of entry into the facility. Both exciting projects are scheduled for completion in 2008.

Canal Street Commerce Center Breaks Ground

In February, project partners broke ground on the Canal Street Commerce Center at the site of the former Milwaukee Stockyards. Developer Ziegler/Bence is developing a 144,000 square foot "green" buildings, using the Menomonee Valley Sustainable Design Guidelines. Once completed, the project will support 200 jobs. Anchor tenant Proven Direct, a full service direct marketing, technology, printing, and fulfillment firm, will move their operations here in early 2008. This project, along with The Sigma Group's building across the street, serves as catalyst for the central Menomonee Valley.

Badger Railing Moves into New MVIC Facility

Long time Valley company Badger Railing moved into a new facility in the MVIC this summer, doubling its size. The Badger staff, along with U.S. Department of the Treasury and Milwaukee Department of City Development representatives, cut the ribbon on Badger's new facility on August 14. The move to 3880 W. Milwaukee Road gives the company room to grow and keeps it close to its existing workforce. Badger Railing created the decorative railings found throughout the Menomonee Valley Community Park and Miller Park.



Caleffi Hydronics Opens New MVIC Building

Caleffi dedicated their new building in the MVIC on September 10, with representatives from Caleffi's Italian headquarters present to open their new North American headquarters. The American team held a ribbon cutting ceremony, and the Italian team led a wine toast on the floor of their new facility. The company moved into their new home at 3883 W. Milwaukee Road in November.

Taylor Dynamometer Is

Latest Business to Build in the MVIC

Taylor Dynamometer, a growing manufacturing firm from New Berlin, purchased 3.3 acres in the MVIC. Taylor, whose growth has been fueled by international demand, began construction on their 40,000 square foot building this summer, and expects to occupy their building in early 2008. The new building at 3630 W. Wheelhouse Road is adjacent to the Menomonee Valley Community Park's future playing fields.

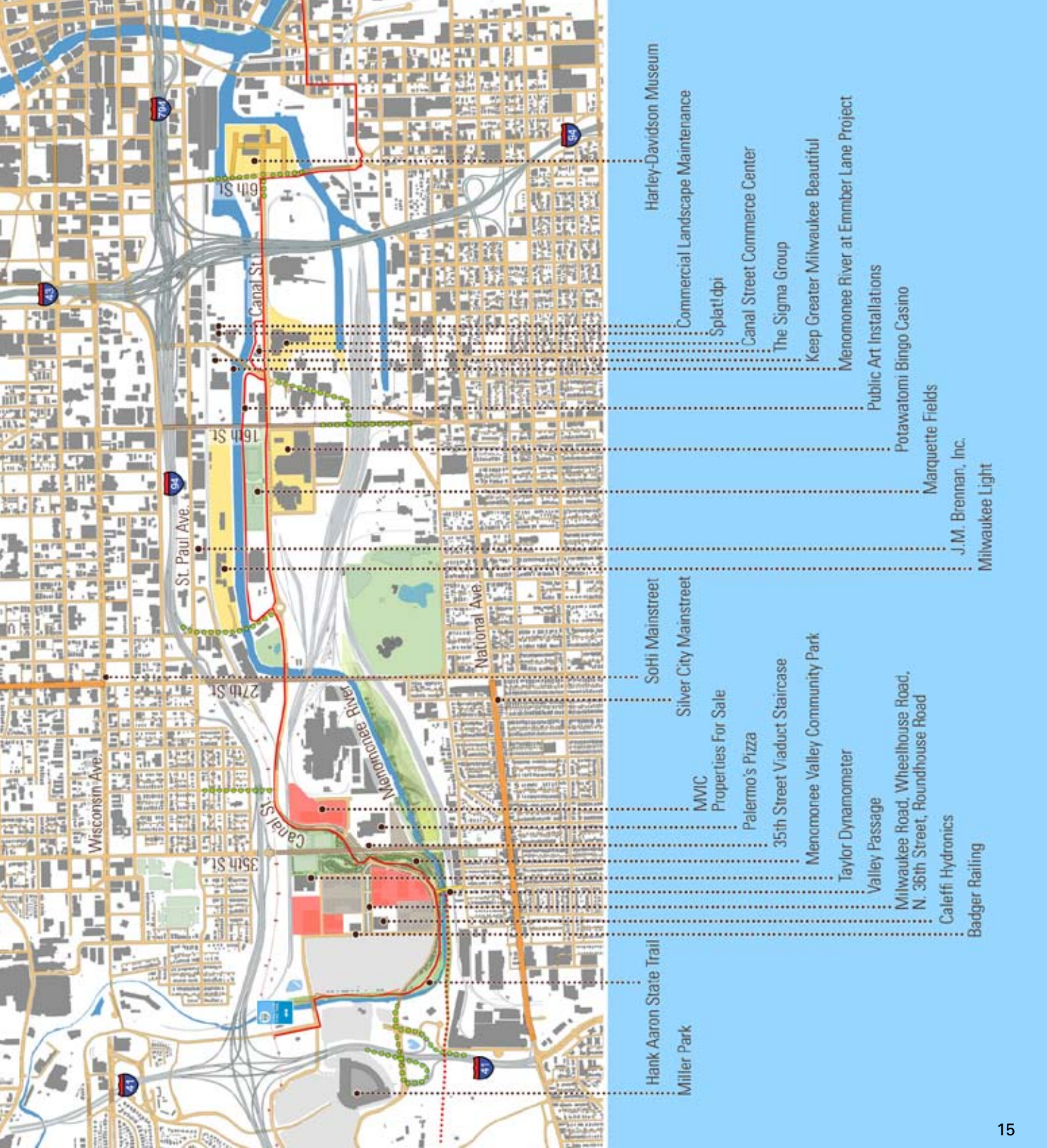
Derse Plans for New Headquarters in MVIC

The 59-year-old company has operations in the Chicago, Las Vegas, Pittsburgh, Atlanta and Dallas metro areas, and works with international clients. Businesses Association Plans Enhanced Business Services

In 2007, the Menomonee Valley Business Association worked to shift their focus from a networking group to a conduit for business resources. This included establishing a Public Safety Roundtable, a Business Resource Committee and an electronic newsletter. MVP staff assisted new Valley businesses in their move to the Valley and began building an inventory of business resources to help with employee retention and recruitment. MVP staff, along with Friends of Hank Aaron State Trail, also began to work with Valley employers to incorporate use and maintenance of the Trail into their wellness programs.

Valley Passage Planned to Link Menomonee Valley and Silver City

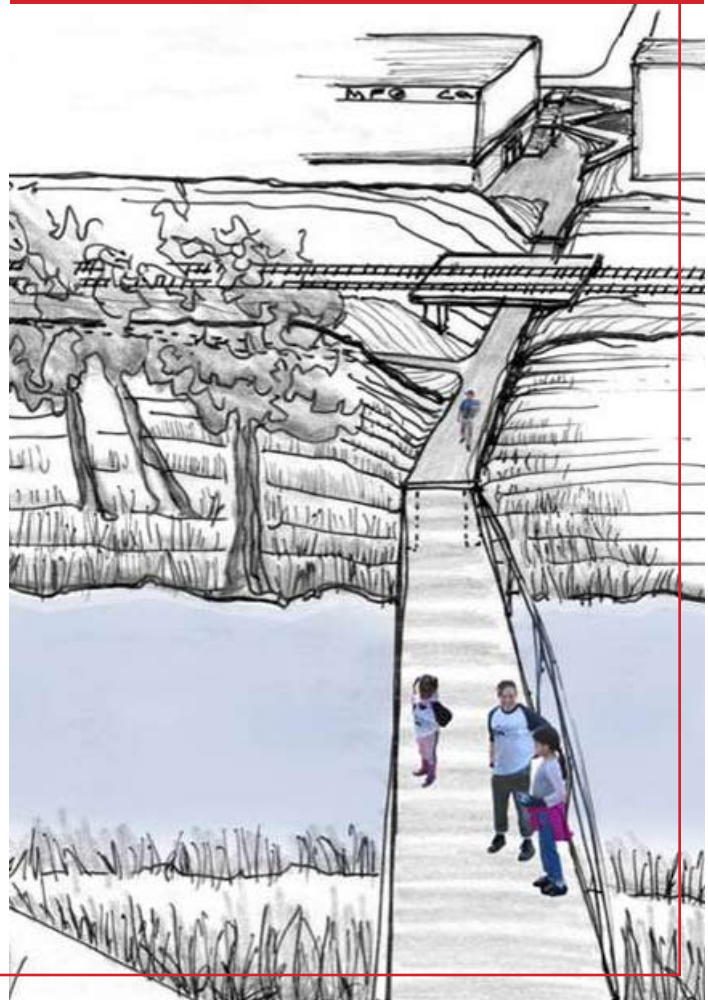
The Wisconsin Department of Transportation, the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and the City of Milwaukee are working with MVP to build the Valley Passage, a pedestrian connection between the Valley and the Silver City neighborhood immediately south of the MVIC. Historically, workers from the Silver City neighborhood got to work in the Valley by passing under railroad tracks through a tunnel, then crossing the river by bridge. Since the bridge was removed and the tunnel sealed decades ago, south side neighbors have to travel nearly 3 miles to get to the jobs and recreation nearly in their backyards. Once the Passage is complete, residents can access jobs or park space with a 2 block walk. The Valley Passage will also serve as a trailhead for DNR's 5.5 mile Hank Aaron State Trail extension.

Plans Move Forward for Solar Panels; Geothermal System

In 2007, Keep Great Milwaukee Beautiful, located on Ember Lane, moved forward with plans to retrofit their building with sustainable features that will result in lower operating costs. The building will soon be equipped with solar panels and a geothermal heating and cooling system. This project was jointly funded by the City of Milwaukee, We Energies and Focus on Energy and will be completed early 2008.

Redevelopment Planning Begins for Milwaukee Light Project

Mallory Properties announced plans for the redevelopment of their landmark property in the center of the Valley, nearly 25 acres between 25th and 16th Streets. Their plan, Milwaukee Light, includes the restoration of the five historic red brick buildings, development of new industrial buildings on vacant land, a new roadway to improve traffic circulation and a Riverwalk along the nearly 10-block stretch of the Menomonee River. Keep watching for news about the redevelopment of this prime business location.

Marquette Plans Renovation of Valley Fields

Marquette University announced plans to renovate the Valley Playing Fields Complex. Valley Fields, a 13.5 acre outdoor recreation complex, includes a natural grass soccer field, artificial turf fields, a running track, and areas for field events. The construction of the new grandstand will include concession service facilities, restrooms, service amenities and aesthetic improvements along Canal Street. These amenities will put Valley Fields in league with the other Division I schools, now that Marquette has joined the Big East.

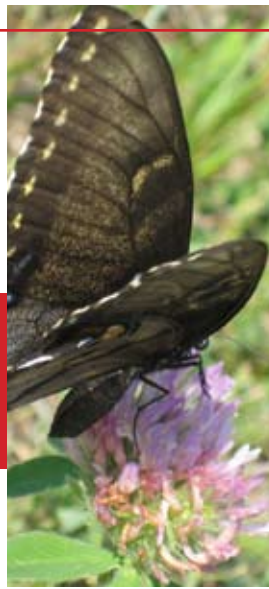

Community Park Vision Becoming Reality

After years of planning, the Menomonee Valley Community Park is taking shape. In 2007, the first phases of the park offered Milwaukeeans access to the Menomonee River for fishing, canoeing and bird watching, as well as a great spot for walks and picnics. Today in the Valley there are 45 acres of public park and trail accessible to the largest population in Wisconsin, giving urban residents opportunities to explore nature right in their own backyards. MVP, the City of Milwaukee, the State of Wisconsin are planning for the next phases of construction. Project partners are also advancing a long-term ownership plan to ensure this newly created public land is well taken care of for generations to come.

Hérons, Salmon and Frogs Return to the Valley

This year the Menomonee Valley Community Park gained hundreds of new residents. Tadpoles moved into the wetland ponds and leopard frogs made a return to the river bank. Muskrats made cozy homes in the newly placed limestone boulders along the riverbank, killdeer nested in the fields, great blue herons spent days along the banks, and countless salmon and trout ran upstream. These new inhabitants signal the health and vitality of the Valley environment and are proof that years of effort to restore the ecosystem are succeeding.



Hundreds Celebrate Earth Day in the Menomonee Valley

Hundreds of volunteers celebrated Earth Day in the Valley on April 21. Volunteers worked all morning planting, pulling debris from the river and collecting trash near the Hank Aaron State Trail. Hundreds of trees and shrubs were planted and dozens of garbage bags of weeds and litter were removed. Afterward, volunteers celebrated with a community picnic in the developing park. The Kiwanis Club of Milwaukee adopted the Valley as their official site, which brought additional helpers and attention to the Valley. Thank you to all those who helped.

Menomonee River Project Moving Forward

The collaborative effort to restore and provide public access to the Menomonee River at Emmer Lane made great progress in 2007. The team of partners secured funding from the Wisconsin Coastal Management Program, City of Milwaukee, Menomonee Valley Business Improvement District and Valley businesses Cargill, Potawatomi Foundation and We Energies. With 85% of the funding in place, the team plans to complete design and engineering this winter and expects construction to take place in summer 2008.

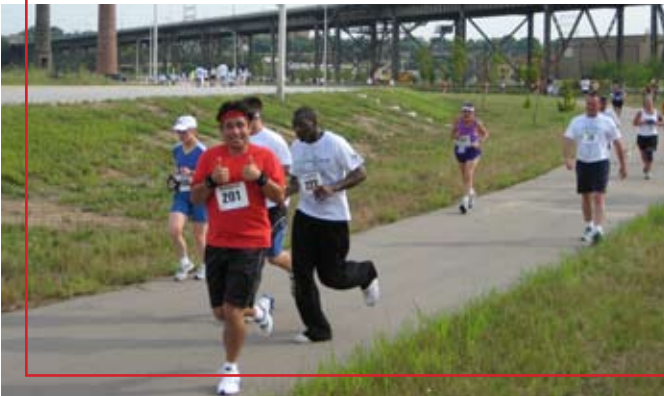
Welcome Community Engagement

Stakeholders Plan for 23 Acre Park Addition

In July, a week-long design workshop gathered biology experts, landscape architects, and neighborhood residents to fine tune design for an additional 23 acres of park to be built on the south bank of the Menomonee River. The design workshop participants developed plans that will protect access to the river and improve water habitat to increase the number of fish species. This area, which is already home to an impressive array of wildlife, will feel like a sanctuary in the heart of the city.

History Made with the Milwaukee Mass Portrait

Nearly 800 people gathered in the new Menomonee Valley Community Park on June 16 to be part of The Milwaukee Mass Portrait, a photograph taken by artist Troy Freund that captured the people and spirit of Milwaukee. The history-making event attracted people from throughout Milwaukee and provided a sneak preview of Milwaukee's newest public park, now under construction. Participants viewed images showing the site as an abandoned railroad shop just 10 years ago, and renderings portraying how this new public park will look in just a few more years.

To assist us in achieving sustainable redevelopment in the Menomonee Valley, MVP is seeking support for these important projects:

- \$1,000 to purchase native plants;

- \$10,000 to construct a trail segment with concrete paving stones made from recycled Valley Power Plant fly ash, a byproduct previously unusable until the development of this new technique; or
- \$25,000 for the development of a bicycle/pedestrian bridge that will connect residents to Valley jobs and recreation.

In addition, MVP will soon be launching a multi-million dollar capital campaign to complete construction of the Valley's signature project.
